## Arinna's Arena

Dear Congregants,

Our synagogue is very fortunate to have its own *mikveh*. Perhaps some of us don't realize just how very special this is. By way of perspective, in the city of Los Angeles which has a Jewish population of half a million people and dozens of synagogues, there is only one community *mikveh* to serve the entire non-Orthodox population. Not a single Conservative, Reform, Reconstructionist or unaffiliated congregation can boast of having one of its own. So for us in Cheyenne, having a *mikveh* is an incredible luxury.

A month ago, our *mikveh* was used for the first time in a long while. Three applicants for conversion each walked down the seven steps and immersed three times while reciting the appropriate blessings. When they emerged, they had been transformed into part of the Jewish people. It was truly an awe-inspiring experience.

A *mikveh* is a special pool that consists of a mixture of naturally flowing water and warm tap water. The seven steps represent each of the days of creation. The *mikveh* is not used for the purpose of bathing; in fact a person who is going to use the *mikveh* takes a very thorough shower before using it. Entering a *mikveh* pool is for spiritual cleansing. It is used by both men and women when a person wants to effect a change of status. Traditional occasions for using a *mikveh* include immersing just before Shabbat or major holidays, prior to one's wedding, after a woman's monthly period, and after coming in contact with a corpse.

Liberal Jews have begun to reclaim the *mikveh* for broader purposes that involve changing from one state to another or for major life transitions. For example, I used a *mikveh* just before my ordination as a rabbi. It could be used on the occasion of an adult bar or bat mitzvah, for the completion of a divorce, after recovery from a long illness, or as a tool for healing from abuse or trauma. There is a chapter in my book, Jewish Women Speak Out: Expanding the Boundaries of Psychology, entitled "No Ordinary Bath: The Use of the *Mikveh* in Healing from Incest," which explores the transformative power of this ancient sacred ritual to wash away the feeling of spiritual defilement.

I would like to remind you that our *mikveh* is available for all of us, not just for people seeking conversion. It is a resource for spiritual cleansing and change. If you have questions about using the *mikveh* or would like to avail yourself of this opportunity, please feel free to talk with me or with Dorothy Feldman. Let's take advantage of our wonderful *mikveh* and not let this incredible resource go to waste.

## Finance Committee Report from Roz Baker

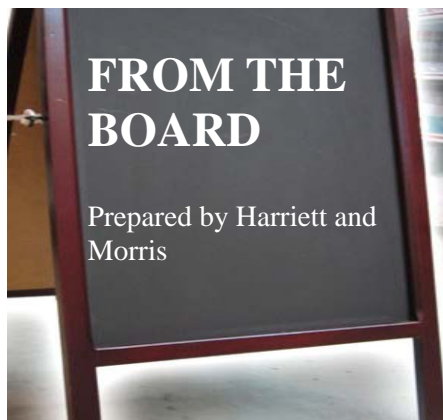
Through August, income from pledges/dues and donations totaled approximately \$27,000.

Social action has been an important part of Jewish tradition dating back to the time of the prophets. We are called upon to help out people in need and to do what we can to repair the world.

Our synagogue's Social Action Committee has resolved to become more active this year. One way that our synagogue is involved with the larger community is through the Cheyenne Interfaith Hospitality Network (CIHN), an organization made up of many congregations who provide, food, shelter and needed services to homeless families.

We have recently teamed up with the First United Methodist Church in this effort. Together our two congregations will be hosting homeless families for one week in early November. First United Methodist will be the host – providing shelter beds at the church and congregants to staff the shelter overnight. Our role is to be the support congregation – providing dinners and socializing with the families during dinner.

Please call or email Phyllis by October 10 to sign up to provide a meal and/or take it to the church during that week. Training will be provided to educate you about the shelter process. Helping out homeless families is an important mitzvah and a good way to start off the new year.

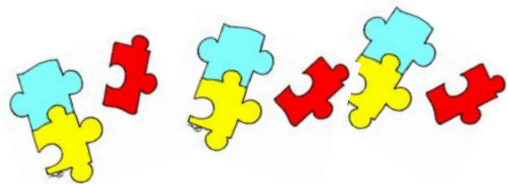



# Eat Something..... You'll Feel Better



We bring you this month, Bea's amazing noodle kugel. It made its first appearance at our Sisterhood luncheon at Ruth's home. By popular demand it re-appeared at the Yom Kippur Break-the-Fast. Bea you are THE WOMAN!! Thanks for sharing this with us.

Mix together and set aside:

1lb medium egg noodles (cooked)	4 eggs, beaten
1C sour cream	1 tsp. vanilla
1C creamed cottage cheese	1 small can fruit cocktail (drained)
Pinch of salt	(I use raisins)
1/2 tsp cinnamon	

Glaze:

3/4 stick butter  
1C firmly packed brown sugar  
1C whole pecan halves

Melt the butter in a 9x13 pan. Sprinkle brown sugar on the bottom. Press pecans into sugar, cut side facing up. Gently add noodle mixture to pan.

Bake at 350° for one hour.

Cool in pan for 10 minutes. Run a knife around the edges of the kugel. Invert pan onto serving platter—keeping pan on for another few minutes to give it time to settle. Remove pan and serve warm.

The brown sugar and pecans will be on top- -very pretty!
