Yesterday in NYC there was a huge (tens of thousands strong) gathering of Jews marching. Fairly quickly put together as a way of solidarity with those who have been attacked more violently during the past few weeks (attacks against those who are quickly identifiable as Jews have been an ongoing problem for years in the greater NYC area), there were contingents from states up and down the East Coast and inland to Ohio, according to self reporting. The Presidents of Yeshiva University and Hebrew Union College walked together during parts of the march. There was also a gathering in Israel at approximately the same time.

One other proposed act of solidarity (which the timing of the newsletters does not allow all of us to participate in at the same time as everyone else) was to wear during the day today something in public that helps identify one as a Jew. A Magen David necklace, an article of clothing with Hebrew on it, a kippah were some examples given. The social media selfie crowd are planning on taking and posting pictures of what they choose to wear.

Tu Bishvat is coming in little over a month. The Religious School has already started to decorate for the day with artwork focusing on trees and bushes. One of the students came up with a quick cartoon showing what might happen if somebody in Wyoming were to try and actually plant a tree in Wyoming on Tu Bishvat itself.
